As the political season heats to a boil, the issue of San Bernardino terrorist Syed Rizwan Farook's encrypted and temporarily inaccessible cellphone has been all but forgotten. But for the rest of us in law enforcement, the problem persists — and that means the threat to the public does as well. When it comes to the operating systems on a smartphone, the worldwide consumer market is securely in the grip of Apple and Google. Their software is installed on more than 95 percent of all mobile phones. Until recently, Apple and Google had maintained a wary but cooperative relationship with American law enforcement in complying with court orders to extract information from a smartphone seized in a crime. This relationship was critical to law enforcement's ability to solve the most violent crimes against society — homicides, shootings, armed robberies, rapes and child-sex crimes.

In April, 2014, Kristine Kirk, 44, was at home with her three children when her husband, 47-year-old Richard Kirk, arrived "delirious" and "paranoid." He was "totally hallucinating," Kristine said in a 911 call, climbing in and out of a first-story window, and asking for someone to kill him. Kirk allegedly took a gun out of a safe and shot and killed his wife. Moments later, as two of the couple's children escaped through a window, Kirk walked into his seven-year-old son's room and asked the child to kill him so that "dad and mom could be together with God." The son didn't go through with it, and police arrived shortly afterward. They discovered that, in the hours leading up to the incident, Kirk had eaten part of a marijuana candy bought legally from a pot dispensary.

**[S. 247](#) - Expatriate Terrorist Act**

**Status:** To be considered by the Senate Judiciary Committee on 6/9

**Summary:** Amends the Immigration and Nationality Act to include as grounds for losing U.S. nationality by a native-born or naturalized citizen taking an oath or making a declaration of allegiance to a foreign terrorist organization after becoming 18 years old. The bill would bar the secretary of state from issuing a passport to anyone attempting to become a member of a terrorist group.

**[S. 356](#) - Electronic Communications Privacy Act Amendments Act of 2015**

**Status:** To be considered by the Judiciary Committee on 6/9

**Summary:** Amends the Electronic Communications Privacy Act of 1986 to prohibit a provider of remote computing service or electronic communication service to the public from knowingly divulging to a governmental entity the contents of any communication that is in electronic storage or otherwise maintained by the provider, subject to exceptions. Revises provisions under which the government may require a provider to disclose the contents of such communications. Eliminates the different requirements applicable under current law depending on whether such communications were: (1) stored for fewer than, or more than, 180 days by an electronic communication service; or (2) held by an electronic communication service as opposed to a remote computing service. Requires the government to obtain a warrant from a court before requiring providers to disclose the content of such communications regardless of how long the communica-

tion has been held in electronic storage by an electronic communication service or whether the information is sought from an electronic communication service or a remote computing service.

**Summary:** To require adequate reporting on the Public Safety Officers' Benefit program, and for other purposes.

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## Legislation on the Floor This Week

### **House:**

#### **[H.R. 5338](#) - Checkpoint Optimization and Efficiency Act of 2016**

**Status:** To be considered in the House under the suspension of the rules on 6/7.

**Summary:** This legislation: grants TSA the flexibility to utilize all personnel present to compensate for long wait lines, including reallocating Behavior Detection Officers to speed up passenger screening efforts and granting greater authority to Federal Security Directors, who know the individual airport best, to make staffing resource decisions; ensures that private stakeholders, airports, and government regulators are coordinating response through a staffing advisory committee; requires TSA to assess its current staffing allocation model and share this model with both air carriers and airports; reallocates canine team assets to high volume airports and checkpoints; and requires TSA to establish a service level agreement and minimum staffing numbers with air carriers and airports.

### **Senate:**

#### **[S. 2943](#) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017**

**Status:** Continued consideration in the Senate this week.

**Summary:** To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2017 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe military personnel strengths for such fiscal year, and for other purposes.

affordability of heroin that is helping to drive this epidemic. Additionally, Senator's discussed the current strategy by the federal government to combat drug use, and whether current programs are enough and working.

**Summary:** This hearing discussed the growing threat of ransomware, and the physical threat it poses it poses, for instance recent cases where hospital records were held for ransom. Concerns were raised amongst Senators and witnesses over the payment of ransoms to regain access to a companies information, and by doing so, this will only encourage and exasperate the situation.

**Summary:** This hearing examined the technological tools that are being used to help secure our nation's borders, as well as past troubles with the procurement process and what CBP is doing differently. Witnesses testified that improvements have been made to decrease cost overruns, and program failures, however, challenges still remain. Chairwoman McSally inquired as to how the information collected is getting into the hands of the agents being sent to confront a situation, and whether more needs to be done to build up the infrastructure to ensure that agents on the ground have more capability to view real-time situational awareness.

House Oversight Committee - Full Committee Hearing - May 25

[Federal Agencies' Reliance On Outdated and Unsupported Information Technology: A Ticking Time Bomb](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined reports of various federal agencies use of outdated information technology, and the costs to maintain such systems. Witness testimony from GAO detailed a recent GAO report that annual IT spending in government has risen to an all-time high of nearly \$90 billion, with 75 percent of that is spent on operations and maintenance, meaning that most of the funding is used for upkeep of old systems. Members of the committee heard about one such instance where the Department of Defense still uses a 1970's IBM Series/I computing system, including 8-inch floppy disk drives, to coordinate operations of the U.S. nuclear forces. Federal CIO Tony Scott advocated for a \$3.1 billion IT modernization fund, which would provide agencies seed funding to upgrade their most outdated systems.

**[Long Lines, Short Patience: The TSA Airport Screening Experience](#)****Summary:** This hearing examined the ever-increasing wait times experienced by air passengers to be screened at TSA checkpoints. Members have expressed frustration with TSA over the increased wait times, however, they have also stated that whatever changes are made, safety is still the number one priority. TSA has claimed that they are operating with fewer officers, while passenger traffic has increased. The Appropriations Committee has already approved the ability of TSA to reprogram \$34 million to hire 768 new agents, however TSA Administrator Neffenger stated that an additional reprogramming of funds may be necessary. **[Cartels and the U.S. Heroin Epidemic: Combating Drug Violence and Public Health Crisis](#)****Summary:** This hearing looked at the heroin epidemic, and what is being done to combat the cartel trafficking of illegal narcotics into the U.S. This hearing examined the partnerships that exist between the U.S. and foreign governments, in particular Mexico, and what more needs to be done to help combat the drug trade. Continued work on strengthening the border, working to improve professionalism and weed out corruption within Mexican law enforcement, and training programs, are few of the initiatives that the U.S. is undertaking to combat the cartels.

House Homeland Security Committee - Transportation Security Subcommittee Hearing - May 26

**[Long Lines, Short Patience: Local Perspectives](#)****Summary:** This subcommittee hearing followed-up on an earlier hearing before the full committee, by hearing local perspectives on the growing problem of long lines at TSA checkpoints. Members heard from various airport officials, and airline representatives. Witnesses agreed that more needs to be done to hire more TSA officers in a timely fashion, increase enrollment in Pre-Check, and stop the diversion of the use of airport security fees for other programs. Additionally, it was discussed that airports need to modernize their infrastructure to reflect the current security needs. Senator Johnson asked questions regarding the long wait times at TSA checkpoints, and what is being done to alleviate those wait times, while ensuring that safety is the top priority. Deputy Secretary Mayorkas stated that the TSA Administrator is actively reforming practices at the agency to address prior deficiencies, while also seeking to hire more screeners and increasing enrollment in Pre-Check. Additionally, Senators asked about the ability to vet those coming into the U.S. under the visa waiver program, and what is being done to combat the propaganda being disseminated by terrorist organizations like ISIL.

**House:****[H.R. 4743](#) - National Cybersecurity Preparedness Consortium Act of 2016**

**Status:** Approved by the House on 5/16

**Summary:** This bill authorizes the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to establish a National Cybersecurity Preparedness Consortium to engage academic, nonprofit, private industry, and federal, state, and local government partners to address cybersecurity risks and incidents, including threats or acts of terrorism. The consortium may: provide training to state and local first responders and officials, develop curriculums, and provide technical assistance; conduct cross-sector cybersecurity training and simulation exercises, including for state and local governments, critical infrastructure owners and operators, and private industry; coordinate with DHS's national cybersecurity and communications integration center to help states and communities develop cybersecurity information sharing programs; and assist in the incorporation of cybersecurity risk and incident prevention and response into existing state and local emergency plans.

**[H.R. 4780](#) - Department of Homeland Security Strategy for International Programs Act**



**Status:** Approved by the House on 5/16

**Summary:** This bill directs the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to submit a comprehensive three-year strategy for international programs in which DHS personnel and resources are deployed abroad for vetting and screening persons seeking to enter the United States. The strategy shall include: specific risk-based goals for such programs; a risk-based method for determining whether to establish new international programs in new locations, given resource constraints, or expand existing international programs; alignment with the highest DHS-wide and government-wide strategic priorities of resource allocations on such programs; and a common reporting framework for the submission of reliable, comparable cost data by DHS components on overseas expenditures attributable to such programs.

#### **H.R. 4407 - Counterterrorism Advisory Board Act of 2016**

**Status:** Approved by the House on 5/16

**Summary:** This bill amends the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish in the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) a board to coordinate and integrate DHS's intelligence, activities, and policy related to its counterterrorism mission and functions. The board shall: (1) advise the Secretary of DHS on the issuance of terrorism alerts, and (2) meet on a regular basis to discuss intelligence and coordinate ongoing threat mitigation efforts and departmental activities. The board's charter shall direct it to focus on the current threat environment and the importance of aligning departmental counterterrorism activities under the Secretary's guidance.

#### **H.R. 4974 - FY 2017 Military Construction and Veterans Affairs and Related Agencies Appropriations Act**

**Status:** Approved by the House on 5/19

**Summary:** Making appropriations for military construction, the Department of Veterans Affairs, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017, and for other purposes.

**Medical Marijuana Amendment:** Prohibits the use of funds to implement, administer, or enforce any Veterans Health Administration Directive relating to the prohibition on VA providers from completing forms seeking recommendations on opinions regarding a veteran's participation in a state marijuana program. (Approved 233-189)

#### **H.R. 4889 - Kelsey Smith Act**

**Status:** Failed in the House under the suspension of the rules on 5/23 (229-158)

**Summary:** To amend the Communications Act of 1934 to require providers of a covered service to provide call location information concerning the telecommunications device of a user of such service to an investigative or law enforcement officer in an emergency situation involving risk of death or serious physical injury or in order to respond to the user's call for emergency services.

#### **H.R. 4167 - Kari's Law Act of 2016**

**Status:** Approved in the House under the suspension of the rules on 5/23

**Summary:** This bill amends the Communications Act of 1934 to require multi-line telephone systems to have a default configuration that allows users to directly initiate a call to 9-1-1 (without dialing any additional digit, code, prefix, or post-fix, including any trunk-access code such as the digit "9") from any station equipped with dialing facilities. Businesses installing such systems must configure the systems to provide a notification to a central location at the facility where the system is installed when a person at the facility initiates a call to 9-1-1 using the system, provided that the system is able to be so configured without an improvement to the hardware.

#### **H.R. 3998 - Securing Access to Networks in Disasters Act**

**Status:** Approved in the House under the suspension of the rules on 5/23

**Summary:** To direct the Federal Communications Commission to commence proceedings related to the resiliency of critical telecommunications networks during times of emergency, and for other purposes.

#### **S. 184 - Native American Children's Safety Act**

**Status:** Awaits signature of the President; Approved in the House under the suspension of the rules on 5/23

**Summary:** Amends the Indian Child Protection and Family Violence Prevention Act to prohibit the final approval of any foster care placement or a foster care license from being issued until the tribal social services agency: (1) completes a criminal records check of each covered individual who resides in the household or is employed at the insti-

tution in which the foster care placement will be made, and (2) concludes that each of those individuals meets the tribe's standards established pursuant to this Act. Defines a "covered individual" as an adult and any other individual the tribe determines is subject to a criminal records check. Requires the Tribe's standards to include requirements that each tribal social services agency: (1) perform criminal records checks, including fingerprint-based checks of national crime information databases; (2) check any abuse registries maintained by the Indian tribe; (3) check any child abuse and neglect registry maintained by the state, and any tribal abuse registries maintained in the state, in which the individual resides; (4) request any other state in which the individual resided during the preceding five years to enable the agency to check its registry; and (5) any other additional requirements that the Indian tribe determines is necessary and permissible within its existing authority, such as the creation of voluntary agreements with state entities in order to facilitate the sharing of information related to the performance of criminal records checks.

#### **[H.R. 5077](#) - The Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017**

**Status:** Approved in the House under the suspension of the rules on 5/23

**Summary:** To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2017 for intelligence and intelligence-related activities of the United States Government, the Community Management Account, and the Central Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability System, and for other purposes.

#### **Senate:**

#### **[S. 2840](#) – Protecting Our Lives by Initiating COPS Expansion Act**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate on 5/18

**Summary:** This bill amends the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to expand the allowable use of grant funds under the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) program to include participation in active shooter training programs.

#### **[H.R. 2577](#) - FY 2017 THUD/MilCon-VA Appropriations Act**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate on 5/19

**Summary:** Makes appropriations for Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies and for the Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies for fiscal year 2017

**Medical Marijuana Provision:** Prohibits the interference with the ability of a veteran to participate in a medicinal marijuana program approved by a State.

#### **[S. 2943](#) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017**

**Status:** To be considered in the Senate when they return on June 6.

**Summary:** To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2017 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe military personnel strengths for such fiscal year, and for other purposes.
