January 16 - 20, 2017

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- Occupying the attention of Washington this week will be the inauguration of Presidentelect Trump on Friday. Once this occurs, expect to see a flurry of activity in the following weeks on rescinding Executive Orders, staffing the new administration, and refocusing of priorities and policy.
- The Senate is in session this week, while the House returns on January 23. Senate committees will continue to hold nomination hearings on Donald Trump's cabinet secretaries. The Senate could potentially hold a floor vote on a couple of the nominations, including Mike Pompeo to be the next Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, James Mattis to be defense secretary and John Kelly to lead the Department of Homeland Security.
- Last week the Judiciary Committee held a two day nomination hearing for Senator Jeff Sessions to be the next Attorney General. The hearing at times was contentious, and included exchanges on topics including immigration, race relations, government surveillance, and a host of other controversial topics. The Senate Judiciary Committee will hold a confirmation vote on Senator Sessions nomination on January 24. The hearing on the nomination of retired General John Kelly to be the next Secretary of Homeland Security before the Homeland Security & Governmental Affairs Committee was much more amicable, it focused heavily on border control issues, and efforts to stop the flow of drugs into the U.S. More on both of these hearings can be found in the review of previous hearings section in this update.
- House Speaker Paul Ryan stated at the start of the 115th Congress during his weekly press conference that revamping the criminal justice system will be a priority in the 115th Congress, and that he has asked the committees of jurisdiction to pick up where they left off last year. Expect this issue to come up early in the House this year.
- **DHS Reauthorization** On January 12, key committee chairmen in the House announced a plan to regularly reauthorize, reform, and improve the Department of Homeland Security in the 115th Congress and beyond. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed by all chairmen of committees with jurisdiction over DHS. You can view the MOU here.
- DOJ Department-Wide Procedures for Eyewitness Identification The Department of Justice announced department-wide procedures on eyewitness identification, which will apply to agents at FBI, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) and the U.S. Marshals Service, and which will guide federal prosecutors when deciding whether to charge a case involving an eyewitness identification. The procedures address the use of "photo arrays," the most common methods used by law enforcement to determine whether a witness can identify the perpetrator of a crime, and are designed to ensure that law enforcement personnel do not suggest to a witness, even unintentionally, that they know which photograph contains the im-

age of the suspect. You can view the memorandum outlining the new procedures here.

- **Presidential Commutations** On January 17, President Obama commuted the sentences of 209 inmates, and issued 64 pardons. The President has commuted the sentences of 1,385 individuals since taking office, which includes 504 life sentences, and 212 pardons. This is the most grants of commutation issued by any President in history. You can view the White House press release <u>here</u>. - National Cyber Incident Response Plan The Department of Homeland Security released a final plan for how government and industry should respond to major cyber incidents. The plan details the roles of federal, state, local and tribal governments, as well as the private sector, in the event of a cyberattack. The guidance also describes how the federal government will coordinate a response and what tools it will need. You can view the plan here.
- Unclassified DNI Report on Russian Hacking On January 6, DNI released a unclassified version of its report on hacking in the run-up to the elections in the U.S. stating, "with high confidence that Russian President Vladimir Putin ordered an influence campaign in 2016 aimed at the US presidential election, the consistent goals of which were to undermine public faith in the US democratic process, denigrate Secretary Clinton, and harm her electability and potential presidency. We further assess Putin and the Russian Government developed a clear preference for President-elect Trump." The report noted however that the Russians did not target vote tallying. - **Terror Threat Snapshot** The House Homeland Security Committee released its monthly snapshot which is an assessment of the growing threat America, the West, and the world face from ISIS and other Islamist terrorists. Key takeaways from the snapshot are: the terror threat environment worsened in 2016; overall terror activity in the West spiked in 2016; ISIS followers are heeding calls to strike wherever they are, using any means necessary; and ISIS is proving more malleable and unpredictable than expected. - **INSA White Paper on Information Sharing-** The Intelligence and National Security Alliance released a new white paper titled "Protecting the Homeland: Intelligence Integration 15 years after 9/11." This paper identifies the continued obstacles to sharing and integrating information and recommends ways to improve collaboration and two-way information sharing among federal, state, local, and tribal authorities, as well as between government and the private sector operators of the nation's critical infrastructure. - **DHS Classifies Elections as Critical Infrastructure** On Friday, December 6, the Department of Homeland Security officially designated election infrastructure as a critical infrastructure subsector. According to the release, "election infrastructure," means storage facilities, polling places, and centralized vote tabulations locations used to support the election process, and information and communications technology to include voter registration databases, voting machines, and other systems to manage the election process and report and display results on behalf of state and local governments. - **RAND Report on Rights and Technological Advances** The RAND Corporation recently published a new report on the emergence of new technology and its affect on an individuals Constitutional rights. The report found a need for developing best practices for assessments of criminal justice data quality, data retention, disclosure of collected data, public examination and correction of criminal justice data, use of telepresence, and model laws and policies for addressing social media use by criminal justice participants. - **DHS Exit Memo** Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson issued an exit memo outlining the agency's progress on a number of issues and a series of areas where he believes improvements are needed. The exit memo addresses topics such as counterterrorism, cybersecurity, immigration and border security, management reform, emergency response, and other issues under the jurisdiction of the agency. FBI: Facial recognition software helps ID Indiana cold-case fugitive

An Indiana man who fled his home state after being suspected of molesting a 10 year old girl in 1999 has been arrested in Salem, according to the FBI. Charles Hollin, 61, was arrested at his job at a Walmart on Tuesday after fleeing the central Indiana area 17 years ago. It was facial recognition software used by the FBI that found Hollin. The FBI in December confirmed a "most likely" facial match of Hollin with Andrew David Hall, the alias he had been using in Salem, according to a complaint affidavit provided by the FBI. Hollin, as Hall, applied for a U.S. passport in 2007 to travel to China. **Continue reading here.**

How Edward Snowden Sabotaged the War on Terrorism Newsweek | Edward J Epstein

The following is excerpted from Edward Jay Epstein's book, How America Lost Its Secrets: Snowden, the Man and the Theft, to be published this week by Knopf.

The slaughter of civilians by terrorists using guns, bombs and even trucks shows no sign of abating, with deadly attacks in Baghdad, Berlin and Istanbul serving up bloody headlines over the holidays. With ISIS losing its traditional war on the battlefield, it is bringing more mayhem to our cities, which offer a nearly infinite number of soft targets. Police can't protect them all—their only hope is to sniff out plots before they end in carnage. Recap of Last Week's Hearings & Markups

Senate Armed Services Committee - Full Committee Hearing - January 5 Foreign Cyber Threats to the United States

Summary: This hearing examined the cyber attacks by foreign governments, in particular reports showing Russian involvement in the hackings at the Democratic National Committee and Clinton campaign officials. Intelligence officials testifying stated that WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange does not have credibility in his denials of the source of information provided to his organization. Senator Graham indicated a more sever response to the hacks are needed. Additionally, some Senators expressed their concerns with the disparaging comments made by President-elect Trump towards the intelligence community, noting however, that there is nothing wrong with skepticism.

Senate Judiciary Committee - Full Committee Nomination Hearing - January 10 & 11 Nomination of Senator Jeff Sessions (R-AL) to be Attorney General - <u>Day 1</u> & <u>Day 2</u> <u>Documents Submitted</u>

Summary: Part one of the nomination hearing for Senator Sessions to be Attorney General was an all day hearing with Senator Sessions, with questions concerning immigration, refugee resettlement concerns, race relations, enforcement of drug laws, surveillance issues, the Violence Against Women's Act, sentencing reform, forensics issues. Day two consisted of testimony from various leaders of law enforcement, civil rights, former colleagues and other advocacy groups. Senator Sessions stated that the role of the Attorney General is to equally and fairly uphold and enforce the laws as written, and would not let his policy positions when he was in the Senate to interfere with his new responsibilities to uphold the laws as written. He stated repeatedly that he would enforce the laws as written, and it is the role of Congress to change the law as they deem fit. Senator Sessions was repeatedly asked about the racial issues that torpedoed his nomination hearing over thirty years ago for a federal judgeship, by repeatedly disavowing any of the allegations, and pointing to his work as a US Attorney, state Attorney General, and as a Senator going after hate groups and eliminating sentencing disparities. Senator Sessions was asked about rapid DNA, and he stated that he strongly supports passage of legislation to permit the use of rapid DNA technology, and anything to eliminate the bottlenecks in forensic analysis should be a priority.

Senate Homeland Security Committee - Investigations Subcommittee Hearing - January 10 <u>Backpage.com's Knowing Facilitation of Online Sex Trafficking</u> **Summary**: This hearing is a follow-up hearing on the ongoing investigation by the subcommittee on Backpage,

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which has been accused of creating a marketplace for sex trafficking. Executives from Backpage refused to testify at the hearing, however, despite the denial of the accusations, they have since shut down its "adult" section of its website.

Senate Intelligence Committee - Full Committee Hearing - January 10 <u>Russian Intelligence Activities</u>

Summary: Intelligence officials testified before the Intelligence Committee on the involvement of Russian hacking during the leadup to the election. Officials testified that they are confident that Russia was behind the hacks of the DNC and Clinton Campaign officials.

Senate Homeland Security Committee - Full Committee Nomination Hearing - January 10 Nomination of retired Gen. John Kelly to be Homeland Security Secretary

Summary: This nomination hearing of John Kelly to be the next Secretary of Homeland Security focused extensively on cybersecurity, and border security issues, including the flow of drugs from Central and South America. Kelly stated that information sharing among DHS components and state and local officials will be a priority. Additionally he noted that border security will be a priority, in part to stem the flow of illegal drugs coming into the U.S. He also stated that working with the governments south of our border will be essential to securing our border and reducing the flow of drugs coming into the U.S. Kelly stated that a border wall is not the only component to securing the border, and other tools, such as sensors, UAVs, and increased border agents will be key. He also stated that so-called "dreamers" would not be a priority for deportation.

Senate Intelligence Committee - Full Committee Nomination Hearing - January 12

Nomination of Rep. Mike Pompeo, R-Kan., to be director of the Central Intelligence Agency

Summary: This nomination hearing of Mike Pompeo to be the next Director of the CIA examined a number of controversial issues including bulk data collection, enhanced interrogations, and Russian cyber attacks during the lead -up to the election. Pompeo listed Russia, behind the Islamic State, Syria and Iran, as one of the leading threats to the United States. He also stated that he has no intention of returning to the use of enhanced interrogation techniques, including waterboarding. He also stated that he has no intention of returning to the practice of bulk data collection, which was curtailed with the USA FREEDOM Act, he stated that some revisions may need to be looked at, and that data collection is an important tool to securing the safety of our nation.

Legislation Considered Last Week

House:

H.R. 304 - Protecting Patient Access to Emergency Medications Act of 2017

Status: Approved by the House on 1/9.

Summary: Emergency medical services personnel could be explicitly authorized to administer seizure medications, narcotic painkillers and other controlled substances under this legislation.

H.R. 239 - Support for Rapid Innovation Act of 2017

Status: Approved by the House on 1/10.

Summary: Under this legislation, the under secretary for science and technology at the Homeland Security Department would support research, development, testing, evaluation and transition activities for cybersecurity technologies. The measure would extend the department's authority to contract with the private sector to conduct R&D projects, through Sept. 30, 2021.

H.R. 240 - Leveraging Emerging Technologies Act of 2017

Status: Approved by the House on 1/10

Summary: This bill requires the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to: (1) engage with innovative and emerging technology developers and firms, including technology-based small businesses and startup ventures, to ad-

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dress homeland security needs; and (2) develop, submit to Congress, and implement a DHS-wide strategy to proactively engage with such developers and firms that focuses on sustainable methods and guidance to build relationships to establish, develop, and enhance DHS capabilities to address such needs. DHS may establish personnel and office space in areas in the United States with high concentrations of such developers and firms, co-located with other assets of DHS or other federal facilities, where possible.

<u>S. Con. Res. 3</u> - A concurrent resolution setting forth the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2017 and setting forth the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal years 2018 through 2026. **Status**: Approved by the House on 1/13; Approved by the Senate on 1/12.

Summary: This resolution sets forth the budget for FY 2017. The resolution includes reconciliation instructions that would allow for speedy consideration of repeal legislation that would be insulated from a Democratic filibuster.
